Before granting admission, many professional education grams require experience a volunteer in physical therapy department of a hospital or clinicar high school students, volunteering with the school athletic trainer is good way to gain experience.

Job Outlook

Employment of physical therapists is **exp**ed to grow by 30 percent from 2008 to 2018, much faster than the average for all occupations.

Earnings
